




Differences Make a Difference







Why has COVID-19 disproportionately hurt our communities?



- There is NO genetic or biological predisposition.
- Systemic racism that has created a chronic lack of access to quality, affordable health care, which leads to underlying health conditions that put individuals at higher risk.
- Higher percentages of individuals in jobs which do not allow them to work from home.




Polls show many in our communities don't trust the vaccine is safe or that it will work.

Percentages polled who say they will take the LATINX **BLACK** COVID-19 vaccine: Trust the **ASIAN** 83% vaccine's 34% 14% safety **LATINX** 63% WHITE 61% Trust the **BLACK** 42% vaccine's 40% 18% efficacy

Pew Research poll conducted Nov. 18-19, 2020. n = 12,648 American adults (Asian Americans surveyed were English-speaking only)

Systemic Racism in Healthcare







People of color are widely underrepresented in the medical field; in the US, just 5% of practicing physicians are Black, 5.8% are Latinx, and 56.2% are white.



Traditionally, our communities have been **underrepresented in clinical trials**, despite the results being generalized to larger populations.

Syphilis Victims in U.S. Study Went Untreated for 40 Years

WASHINGTON, July 25—For 40 years the United States Public Stealth Service has conducted a study in which human beings with syphilis, who were induced to serve as guines pigs, have gone without medical treatment for the disease and a few have died of its late offects, even though an effective therapy was eventually discovered.

The study was conducted to determine from autopales what the disease does to the human hady.

Officials of the health service who initiated the experiment have long since retired. Current officials, who say they have serious doubts about the morality of the study, also say that it is too late to treat the syphilis in any surviving participants.

Doctors in the service say they are now rendering whatever other medical services they can give to the survivoes while the study of the disease's effects continues.

Dr. Merlin K. DuVal, Assistant Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare for Health and Scientific Affairs, expressed shock on learning of the study. He said that he was making an immediate investigation.

The experiment, called the Tuskegee Study, began in 1932 with about 600 black men.

Officially called the "Tuskegee Study of Untreated Syphilis in the Negro Male," the federal government oversaw an experiment in which about **400 black men** with syphilis were deliberately left untreated so doctors could study the disease.

45 years ago, the nation learned about the Tuskegee Syphilis Study. Its repercussions are still felt today.







COVID-19 VACCINES ARE SAFE.



The COVID-19
vaccines underwent
the same rigorous
safety approval
process as all
other vaccines.

THE VACCINE IS FREE FOR EVERYONE.



The vaccine will be free for everyone, regardless of insurance status.



COVID-19 VACCINES ARE EFFECTIVE.



In clinical trials, both vaccines (Moderna and Pfizer) were found over 90% effective, which is excellent.



YOU DO NOT NEED TO BE A U.S. CITIZEN TO GET THE VACCINE.

You will not need to prove U.S. citizenship to get a COVID-19 vaccine in Colorado. Public health will never share your information for any immigration or law enforcement purposes.

TRIALS INCLUDED VOLUNTEERS FROM MANY BACKGROUNDS.

About 40% of vaccine trial volunteers identified as Black, Latinx, Asian and Native-American. The trials had positive results, showing that the vaccines are safe and effective for our communities.



To respond to the health and economic crisis of the pandemic, medical researchers worked quickly, building on decades of vaccine science, to get safe vaccines to us.



MILD SIDE EFFECTS ARE COMMON.

Vaccine reactions are possible but usually mild - like arm pain, low fever and body aches. This is common and means the vaccine is working. Talk to your doctor if you are allergic to a component in the vaccine.

STOPPING THE VIRUS WILL TAKE ALL OF US.

As with all vaccines, the success of this effort depends on us all. If we join together to get vaccinated, we can protect ourselves, our communities and our state.



Social Media

Black Americans are almost 3 times as likely to die from COVID-19 than non-Latinx White Americans.

Latinx Coloradans make up 29.5% of total COVID-19 cases, but only 20% of the state's population.



Native Americans in Denver County make up 2.4% of total COVID-19 cases, but only 0.4% of the county's population.
