Community Outreach and Awareness: Communicate vaccine information with healthcare providers, parents, the media and organizations




Provider Education: Educate health care professionals on crucial and timely vaccine-related topics

- Our mission is to empower minority and underserved communities to tackle health inequities and improve community well-being.
- Our vision is to see historically marginalized communities take complete control of their health and realize their full life potential.

- CDPHE's invitation for CBO's to support inequitable vaccine access through pop-up clinics






Planning Equity Clinics

- Existing channels of communication
- □ Learning from Mary Etta and Julia's experience
 - ✤ Leverage community trust
- Requesting vaccines and support from CDPHE
 Planning with CDPHE clinic leads
- □ Recruiting volunteers (reflective of community)
 - Organizing team
 - Cultural competency training





Planning Equity Clinics

- Outreach to high density BIPOC communities
- Prioritized vaccination site in Adams County
 Solid Rock Baptist Church
 - Underserved zipcode/community
 - > African immigrant church
 - > ADA-compliant
 - ➢ Big parking lot
 - Easy access
- Decided on monthly clinics
 - ➢ Community capacity
 - Volunteer capacity
 - Resources (Zero funding)




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

Focus on Latinx Outreach

- □ 21% of the Colorado population is Hispanic or Latinx
- Accounted for 36% of COVID-19 cases and 8.8% of vaccinations as of April 28, 2021
- Compared to White population who are almost 68% of the population but made up 70% of vaccinated people

□ Barriers included:

- ➤ Language
- Limited knowledge of the healthcare system
- ➤ Lack of health insurance
- Immigration challenges
- ➤ Technology, and
- Ongoing racial/ethnic discrimination





Focus on Latinx Outreach

- Latinx colleagues joined core organizing group
 Paola and Ivonne
- □ Recruited more Latinx volunteers
- Cultural competency training (designed by Paola)

 Focused outreach through community navigators (to reach sub-communities)

- Expanded language translation services
 - □ Registration
 - □ Spanish call/text center
 - Clinic admission team





Goal: Inclusion

- Know the weaknesses of the community, and leverage their strengths
 - Strengths-resilience, community unity and support, strong family systems
 - Weaknesses*- language; gaps in health literacy; challenges with navigating healthcare system
- Know and repeat what has worked in the past
 Avoid reinventing the wheel
- Experiment new culturally-informed approaches cautiously




We felt very welcomed with the volunteers doing an exceptional job of keeping everything running smoothly.

Engaging Diverse Communities COVID-19 Vaccine Pop-Up Clinic Solid Rock Baptist Church Site

Welcome and thank you for supporting our COVID-19 Vaccine Pop-Up Clinic! This event is an exciting day, as it is the culmination of hard work and planning so that we can help reduce vaccination disparities that are particularly pronounced in communities of color. Although we have outreached to communities of color in particular, we value all forms of diversity and want to create a safe, welcoming, and inclusive environment across all forms of difference – such as race, ethnicity, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion/faith, neurological diversity, ability, and more. We can create an inclusive space that values everyone by practicing the below guidelines.

SHOW RESPECT AND HAVE PATIENCE

It is important to remember that volunteers and community members arriving for a vaccine may have different language, literacy, learning, and cultural needs. We need to make sure that we are being respectful, patient, and professional, as well as abiding by cultural norms to the extent possible.

LANGUAGE ACCESSIBILITY

Clinic materials (e.g., flyers, registration forms, etc.) are translated into English and Spanish, and there will also be interpreters the day of the clinic. Connect with Isaac to learn what languages in addition to Spanish may be available for interpretation the day of the clinic.

Further, it may be challenging to hear with the added barrier of masks. You may need to ask community members to repeat themselves – that is okay. It may also be helpful to have community members write down their name or information directly if you are struggling, so keep a pen and paper with you.



EXPLAIN AND REINFORCE CONFIDENTIALITY

Many communities have concerns about the information they are providing, who will be looking at it, and how it will be presented. If community members are in the country without documentation, there may be additional concerns about how their information may be used. If needed, assure the community that their information will not be used by anyone to enforce immigration laws.

PRACTICE SELF CARE

Remember to practice self-care throughout the day! Make sure you are cating, hydrating, and taking breaks. We must take care of ourselves in order to care for others!

CENTER HEALTH EQUITY

Finally, remember that the purpose of this COVID-19 Vaccine Pop-Up Clinic is to help reduce vaccination disparities so that everyone – regardless of where they live, learn, work, and play – can be healthy. Please treat everyone with compassion and dignity!



Lessons Learned

Planning with the community is critical

□ Volunteer cultural competency training

- Continuous improvement to provide best quality services and welcoming atmosphere
- Constant communication with vaccine providers to avoid mishaps
- Partnering with other individuals/CBOs is a good use of resources, and improves community engagement





Lessons Learned

□ Funding, funding, funding!

- Critical feedback from the community is important and should be welcomed:
 Checking birthdates
 - Ineligible people could unknowingly receive vaccines
 - Parking lot flowCongestion
